

Examples of how British Values are taught through curriculum subjects at our school

RE	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Everyone is unique and valued. • Everyone is equal. • Learning about different Religions. • Gospel Values.
English	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Variety of non-fiction. • Poems and stories from other cultures. • Historical stories. • Debates, discussions. • Origins of words, spellings and grammatical structures.
Geography	<p>Ask and answer questions such as:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • What is my place in the world? • Where do I live? • How am I connected to other people and places? • Where and how do other people live? • What are other people and places like?
P.E.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Builds character and embeds values such as fairness, respect, good sportspersonship. • Code of conduct; rewards and sanctions. • Rules and choices. • Working individually and in groups. • Individuals are listened to and respected regardless of differences.
MFL	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Preparation for being a global citizen in a global community. • Appreciation of culture and traditions of other countries. • Communication with native speakers. • Positive and respectful awareness of the world beyond the classroom.
Art, Design and Technology	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Understanding own culture as well as the culture of others. • Understanding that cultures are always changing and coping with that change. • Opportunities to reflect on own preferences, values, likes and dislikes. • Consideration of own and others' needs.
Music	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Democratic values of equality and mutual respect. • Reciprocal relationship with genres and traditions from around the world. • Promotion of risk-taking, self-expression, ownership. • Draws together different communities regardless of faith, age, gender, culture, race, sexual orientation. • Promotion of collaborative ways of working. • Built upon principles of inclusion and equality.
History	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Learning from other countries, cultures and civilisations from around the world and through the ages. • Finding out how mistakes in the past can be learned from and shape the future. • Significant historical people and events.

The children also learn about the British Values through our wider curriculum, our extra-curricular activities and our expectations about behaviour.

The dinner hall, for example, provides opportunities for promoting all four British Values:

Democracy	Take turns; stand in a queue; rotation of classes
Rule of Law	Follow dinner hall rules; consequences of unacceptable behaviour
Individual Liberty	Choices about selection of food
Respect and Tolerance of those with Different Faiths and Beliefs	Treat everyone respectfully; choose correct plate

It is possible to embed British Values in all aspects of school life and this is what we aim to do at St. Hugh's.
